## Quantitative 4NT - Turbo Charged

Most every player has learned that when partner opens 1NT or 2NT that a response of 4NT is not ace asking. It is invitational to slam. It is referred to as: Quantitative NT. Opener has two options:


- 1. Pass with a minimum hand, 15HCP or a flat 16HCP.
- 2. Bid 6NT with maximum hand, 17HCP or a robust 16HCP.

That is pretty straight forward. Pass or bid 6NT. Your decision is all based entirely on the evaluation of how good your 15-17 points is.

However, there is a very clever agreement that my partner and I have which we refer to as a Minor Suit Slam Locater. If we decide to pass – then that is it. We play in 4NT.

However, if we decide that we want to accept partner's invitation to bid slam – why not add a few steps in between 4NT and bidding 6NT? There is a lot of room to reveal more about the nature of your hand. For example, I played this hand in 6NT:



I liked my chunky 16-count with a 5-card club suit and accepted the invitation by bidding 6NT. North led the \$\int J\$. Unfortunately, I only had 11 top tricks. I could see how easy 6\$\int \text{was}\$ was – and I tinkered around for a while before finally taking the heart finesse. When this failed – so did the contract. This hand is from a Can-At in Quebec City back in the late 80's. Our team was Gylfi, me Leo and Peter Clark. I remember it well because it cost us the semi-final match in the main Knockout - against a top team (they were in 6\$\int \). We lost the match by 7 imps – and this hand alone cost us 16 imps! It was a tough loss for our team. Years later – I discovered an innovative response system to 4NT Quantitative. It would have allowed us to find the club slam after the 4NT bid. If only I had known it back then.

### Minor Suit Slam Locater

The reason this is isolated to locating a minor suit slam (and not a major suit slam) is because responder could have bid Stayman over 1NT or a Jacoby Transfer. Hence it is inferred that we do not have a major suit fit.

This is the response structure:

In all the above auctions, North has accepted the invitation to slam. Hence - a maximum hand.

- 1. North has a 4-card club suit. South has shown a 4-card diamond suit. North's bid of 6♦ reveals she also has a 4-card diamond suit.
- 2. North shows a 5-card club suit and South passes happy to find the club fit.
- **3.** North denies holding a 4-card or a 5-card minor suit.
- 4. North denies holding 4-clubs but has a 4-card diamond suit. South wants to play in 6NT.
- 5. North has a 4-card club suit. South's bid of 6♣ reveals her stance.
- 6. North has shown a 4-card club suit but denies holding a 4-card diamond suit.
